MINISTER'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

As we appreciate the warmer weather, we are also being warned about a possible drought over the summer months. One of the benchmarks of this problem is that the water levels are close to those measured in 1976, when the country suffered a severe heatwave and drought.

I was born in 1977, so I only hear about this through anecdotes and recollections from those who lived through it, however the event is so important and had such an impact I still hear about it even today.

This reminds me of two very different things, even though they offer similar theological reflection.

The first of these is that this event is like the exile in Babylon for the Hebrews once they had returned to Jerusalem. So embedded in their story was this event, that this shaped the Pharisees' and temple priests' response to Jesus, who was very much rocking the boat with the Romans. Any attempt to challenge the Empire that was now in charge was seen by those leaders as too risky – and this shaped the events that we know so well that led to Jesus' crucifixion.

The other of these is a novel named *The Trouble with Goats* and *Sheep*, a book about two girls who hear the local priest share this sermon at their church. This is all set within the context of the great drought of 1976, which is described in vivid

detail and shapes the plot of the story which leads to a dramatic climax.

Of course, the passage about the Goats and the Sheep is from Matthew 25 and is part of a discourse which includes the parable of the talents. As I have explored before, the parable of the talents traditionally was seen as passage challenging us in our discipleship to be obedient, but further academic reflection can lead us to conclude that this is more about Jesus challenging the Pharisees and the way they hypocritically determine who is righteous and who isn't – and perhaps the same could be made as an analysis of the Goats and the Sheep too.

It is this interpretation that reinforces the thought that the Pharisees, although wrong in their attitude and actions, are only responding to what they think is best – to avoid exile as their nation had experienced the last time they turned away from the Law and making sure it was followed to the letter.

So, when someone reminds you of an event in the past, perhaps reflecting on whether or not it is limiting your future actions or decision making is helpful? Jesus seems to challenge us to do this through these parables, and perhaps we too are guilty of looking back and acting on what we know happened in the past – instead of seeing God in the now - and leaving the future to Him.
