MINISTER'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

As we look forward to a new year, key Christian events might seem quite far off. Easter is later this year which of course means we have a longer than usual wait for Lent, and then Pentecost and the Ascension are then pushed out even further. Of course, as a non-conformist denomination we are not tied to these dates, and it has been known for URC churches to only celebrate Easter and Christmas, the other Holy Days being ignored.

But there is something about following a pattern of worship over the year that reaches key points of focus and reflection that enable us to really take stock of our faith and reflect deeply on Jesus' ministry, our faith through Christ, and where the Holy Spirit might be taking us personally, or even corporately in our church communities.

Advent and Lent are just such periods. There is sometimes a tendency in Advent to bring Christmas a little early – which takes the place of the opportunity to reflect on waiting and what the future coming of Christ might feel like. Likewise with Lent, sometimes we know about the traditions and give things up (or take things up as is a more recent trend), but do we really enter Lent as Jesus did – forty days of reflection on our faith and where God wants us to be?

Of course, we have a few weeks now until we reach the start of Lent in March, but as we approach perhaps this is an opportunity to pray and discern where God wants us to be – and to enter into the period of Lent doing just that?

I am always available to talk through this if you wish – perhaps some time reflecting together on what this might mean would be useful?

Either way, as we move into a new year, I hope that you find the opportunity to really explore where your faith might be, and where God might take you!

SECRETARY'S BITS AND PIECES FOR FEBRUARY/ MARCH 2025

May I wish you all a belated 'Happy New Year' and hope you all had a very happy and peaceful Christmas? Both are probably a long and distant memory now! February possibly isn't a favourite month, but its short and daylight hours are starting to get longer – we can look forward to spring. The daffodils are appearing in our gardens.

We have a chance to get our breath back, as these months are much quieter after all the hustle and bustle of December. Our carol service was again a resounding success, with 70 – 80

coming along. This service was led by the Worship Group and included readings by people outside of our own Church family, some who have never done anything similar before. The service was so well received that we've already booked this year's – put it in your diary, Sunday 21st December, same time same place.

Thanks to all who signed the 'big' Christmas card and made a donation to charity for the privilege. We were able to make charitable donations of £85 to both Open Sight (Hampshire) and Prostate Cancer UK as a result of this. From the retiring collection at the carol service, we were able to send an amazing £250 to Oakhaven Hospice. Thank you so much for your generosity in these challenging times – all three charities who received money were very grateful.

A select group enjoyed our celebration New Year lunch at the beginning of January on what was one of the wettest, windiest Sundays we'd had for a while. It was a really enjoyable occasion, with a lovely meal provided by the Fellowship and Fundraising team and entertainment from Pete and Elaine.

When you next come into Church, you will notice the slightly different layout of the chairs. The curved layout of the chairs for the Christmas service had attracted much favourable comment, it was felt to be more welcoming and makes it easier for the people sitting on the left side of the Church to see the projected images. At our recent Church meeting it was agreed to trial this configuration.

Many of you will know that we had heating problems over Christmas into the New Year. It has been fixed for the time being but it is realised that we are going to need to spend a lot of money on it this coming year.

Those of you who have read Andrew's report for the Church meeting will note that there are other things that we'll need to spend out on also. At the Church meeting we were all asked to think of ways we could raise money to cover what needs doing. Hire rates have been increased, as have the amount of hirings. As Church members, we were asked to think of ways we could raise extra money, including increasing our own giving.

It was recently brought to the attention of the elders that by our use of YouTube to stream our services we may well be breaching data protection rules. For the time being, until our policy can be amended, Christian names only will be used in our prayers and no mention made of ailments, so that people cannot be identified. You will also notice a cautionary note included on the projected service.

Easter is very late this year, Easter Sunday can be any time between March 22nd and April 25th. This year it happens to be on April 20th, so more about that in our next edition of the 'Open Door'. Hopefully it will be warmer and we can enjoy our forecourt service on Good Friday. But a reminder that British summer time starts on Sunday 30th March – the clocks will go FORWARD at 1.00 am on that date.

And finally....thanks to all of you who do so much to keep our lovely Church running and welcoming. Everything, whether large or small, is appreciated.



or tried the clean water from every fountain; if I have not discovered who is the author of so much free beauty and so much peace, I have arrived nowhere.

If from today I do not continue walking on your path, searching for and living according to what I have learned; if from today I do not see in every person, friend or foe a companion on the Camino; if from today I cannot recognize God, the God of Jesus of Nazareth as the one God of my life, I have arrived nowhere.

LYMINGTON UNITED REFORMED CHURCH Guidelines Governing Forecourt Parking

1. Parking Spaces

The Church Forecourt has five designated car parking spaces, three on the east side adjacent to the wall of Elliot's, and two on the west side parallel to the Old Manse fence, as marked (See Over)

Two of the five are permanently allocated, one for the Minister and the other for a Disabled Driver i.e. a Blue-badge holder that is to be displayed at all times.

An additional Parking space is also allocated for one Mobility vehicle adjacent to the front north wall of the church adjacent to the east side car parking spaces.

Due to the limited number of spaces, parking is restricted to Church Members, associates, volunteers and premises hirers actively engaged on Church duties or hire events.

The minister allocated parking space shall remain vacant at all times unless prior approval has been obtained from the Centre Manager or the Church Secretary.

2. Weekdays (Monday to Friday)

Lymington URC Parking Permits for specific day(s) will be issued by the Centre Manager to Church group leaders for a set number of people whilst engaged in the Open Door Cafe or gardening duties plus hire groups.

Cars should not be left for personal shopping purposes.

3. Saturday Parking

During the Months of October to April parking is available specifically for the Saturday Coffee morning team and others on church duties. Restrictions on the Minister's parking space and the Disabled Drivers space should be observed (as para 1 above).

Saturday Forecourt Car Boot Sales (8.00am and 2.00pm); from the first Saturday in May until the last Saturday in September, forecourt parking is not available during that period.

4. Sunday Service Parking

The five parking spaces are allocated on Sundays for the Minister/Preacher and the Organist, the remaining 3 spaces are reserved for Blue Badge disabled drivers only. Those on other Church duties are expected to park on the road or in the local carparks

Drivers dropping off a non-driving disabled person (who may have a blue badge) are asked to park on the road or in the local carparks. (Currently Sunday parking on the High Street is free of charge).

5. General Conditions

On days of Weddings, Funerals or special church events, parking is by prior arrangement via the Church Secretary.

The general public are not permitted to park in the forecourt at any time unless on specific church enquiry matters or business.

Car must not be parked in front of the Church main entrance glass doors at any time.

The practice of Chevron Parking is not permitted at any time.

Single seated mobility vehicles and bicycles may be parked at the rear of the church hall clear of the fire escape. Vehicles of any description must not be parked or left in the church east side walkaway at any time. All users of the forecourt carpark shall avoid damage to the grass areas, kerb stones, the gates and other cars when manoeuvring their vehicles on entering or leaving the carpark.

Cars parked on the church premises are left entirely at the owner's risk.

The church will not be held responsible for any loss or damage to vehicles or loss, or damage caused by a driver to another vehicle whatsoever.

The last car driver to leave the forecourt carpark on any day shall close the church gates.
