MINISTER'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

As I look out of the manse window, I can see the changes that autumn (and what feels like an early winter!!) brings.

The trees are starting to look a different shade of colour and are a little bit more sparse, and the sounds and movement of nature are slowly disappearing.

This time of change in nature is of course part of the cycle of the seasons, the changes affected by the rotation of our planet around our sun. Of course, many years ago it was thought that we were at the centre of the universe, and it took a long time for the church (and the world) to catch up with the reality and change its viewpoint to reflect what we were able not only deduce, but to prove through scientific endeavour and space exploration.

I think we sometimes forget that the world-view we hold now will be very different to that of our Gospels. The world that Jesus and the disciples inhabited understood a flat earth with an above and a below. References to where God might (or might not) be were based on this world understanding, and illness, both mental and physical was considered due to sin, where the only cure would have been enough repentance and a decision of the temple or priest that the person was now "cured". For many who were unwell, the act of Jesus healing them was more than a physical change, but also a religious one. Jesus would have declared them well where the temple may not have done — sometimes due to the correct payment to the temple being made to support the cure being carried out. This was liberating, an act that would have changed the social status of those who were now marginalised and on the edge of society to being accepted and welcomed again.

This liberation is at the heart of the Great Commission, where Jesus commands the disciples at the end of Matthew to "Go, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.". This is about reaching out to everyone, regardless of social status or position and offering them the chance to encounter God and form a loving relationship.

So, as we see the change in the world around us at Autumn, let's remember that this change in the world around us can also be reflected in our work as Christians, where change for those that we encounter, who might welcome it, can be a liberating experience that responds directly to Jesus command.


Postcard from St Paul's first Journey

I am sure that everyone is familiar with St Paul's missionary journeys. The stories of Diana of the Ephesians, the wreck on the coast of Malta and so on, but, like us, the details often get overlooked.

His first journey took him to Cyprus and then to what is now Turkey. He was accompanied by Barnabas and John Mark and, leaving from Seleucia, the port of Syrian Antioch. Now it is suggested they called into Cyprus first as Barnabas knew the place. They then moved to Asia Minor, to Perga, Pisidian Antioch, Iconium, Lystra, and Derbe, before returning home.

Over the years Judith and I have been lucky enough to visit the Mediterranean's various holiday destinations and from time to time have found ourselves crossing the path of St Paul. Many years ago my daughter was married in Cyprus and while touring around we found ourselves in the ruins of Roman Paphos where a pillar is shown as the place where Paul was tied up and scourged. It has to be said that Paul didn't mention this event

directly, but did say he had been whipped several times during his journeys. Despite this alleged scourging he eventually overcame a hostile Jewish advisor to convert the local Roman governor, a first in the annals of early Christianity.

More recently we visited Turkey, flying into Antalya, coincidentally also the place that Paul's party arrived. We were staying further down the coast at a little town called Side (pronounced seeday) itself with some well-presented Graeco Roman ruins. On enquiring about visiting Ephesus, a name we both knew, we found it much too far for a day trip, but

were encouraged to visit Perga instead.

Here we quite literally found ourselves in Paul's footsteps. The earliest church was simply the rounded end of the hippodrome or stadium which had been walled off and the existing tiers of seating was used by the congregation. Later a church proper was built closer to the main gates of Perga, but now not as accessible to the visiting tourist.

Standing on the sands of the first church it was possible to imagine the scene. Paul, standing under an awning, preaching to the

crowds on the tiers of seats. Four stones set into the ground might have been the base of such an awning, and standing there in the heat when we visited suggested the awning would have been very necessary!

Apparently Paul didn't preach at Perga that time, but did so on his way back from the other cities of Asia Minor. Clearly he made a significant impression as the city became a religious centre for Christianity even as its commercial importance waned with the silting up of the river.

It would seem that this area held a sophisticated population and the evidence for this was to be found, not only in Perga's religious significance, but also in the three large Graeco Roman theatres we visited. Whilst two were under repair one was still in everyday use and was currently putting on a play about Troy. Allegedly this one had been in almost daily use since it was first built 2000 odd years ago!

Where next for us, you might ask? We have been fortunate to have been to Malta, staying near St Paul's Bay, although later research has now suggested an alternative site for his shipwreck. We have been to Rome and visited the Vatican City, but failed to visit St Paul's Basilica, his burial place, so there are a couple of places we may yet follow him in his journeys before we get too old for gallivanting around!
